Why is reading important?

What does the research say?

"The new Reading Framework ...makes clear that...providing as many opportunities as possible for children to read and be read to is the single most important and beneficial thing that schools can do.."

Oxford Education, 2023



What are the benefits of reading?

- Positive reading attitudes associated with **higher average** reading achievement and overall attainment in school
- It develops imagination, empathy and an understanding of the world
- It supports their vocabulary and communication skills
- It supports their wider learning across the curriculum
- It improves general social and emotional well being



However...

- •Reading enjoyment levels have decreased significantly since the pandemic.
- Young people's reading enjoyment is at crisis point with the lowest enjoyment levels recorded in 2023 since 2005.
- •Just 2 in 5 young people aged between 8-18 enjoy reading in their spare time.
- •Fewer boys enjoy and engage in reading in their spare time compared with girls.
- •Reading enjoyment decreases with age.





What can you can do?





1. Read with your child and talk to them about what they are reading





WHY READ 20 MINUTES AT HOME?

Student A Reads	Student B Reads	Student C Reads
20 minutes per day	5 minutes per day	I minute per day

1,800,000 words per year	282,000 words per year	8,000 words per year

If a student starts reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3.



2. Make time to share in reading - anything and in any language!





- Reading a poem together
- Reading a newspaper/ magazine
- Cooking a recipe together
- Read out loud to each other
 - Read silently with each other

3. Model being a reader







Having books in the home is associated with both reading enjoyment and confidence. Of children who report having fewer than 10 books in their homes, 42% say they do not like reading and only 32% say they are 'very confident' readers. For children who report having over 200 books at home, only 12% say they do not like reading and 73% consider themselves 'very confident' readers. 8

Audio Stories

Online audio stories for children: for Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 primary school pupils, aged 4 – 11. Stories cover a broad range of primary topics. Stories are grouped by theme and Key Stage and are typically about 5 minutes long. Ideal for fostering speaking and listening skills and stimulating children's imaginations. New stories added week by week.









5. Subtitles on your TV





5. Subtitles on your TV - in any language!

Based on an academic study of 2,350 children, 34% became good readers with schooling alone. But when exposed to 30 minutes a week of subtitled film songs, that proportion more than doubled to 70%. There are lots of studies about the benefits of subtitles. This is just one!
